Docents at the Oakley Farm

At the Oakley farmstead we are beginning to train docents to act as if they were part of some of the families that have owned and lived at the Oakley farm.


In April, Center Players produced the original play, *Meet the Oakleys*. From that play showing some of the families that lived at the farm, the idea came to have costumed docents portraying some of those characters giving house tours and participating in events. A first training was held in June, with a workshop led by Bernice Garfield-Sitza, artistic director of Center Players.

At a concert in September, one trainee played the adolescent son of a wealthy distiller, Elijah Combs, who owned the farm between 1800 and 1850. "Thomas Combs" offered apples to our guests as a young man trying to earn his way to college. He collected significant donations, entertained our guests and had a great time himself. We plan to provide more opportunities to act as one of the farm's occupants and bring a bit of our history to life.

QR Code Project

So you have seen these codes around at restaurants and museums, but what exactly ARE they?

"QR" is an acronym for "Quick Response". Essentially they are a barcode, just like the ones on the products we buy at stores. They hold information: a link to a website, phone numbers, messages, etc. Most QRs that we encounter everyday are simply a link to an internet site.



If you do not have a QR reader built into your camera, have no fear, you can still use QR codes. You will just need to download a QR app from your app store. Some Apple QR codereaders are: QR Reader for iPhone, QR Code Reader: Quick Scan, and QR Code Reader & Code Scanner. Some Android apps are: Kaspersky's QR Code Reader and Scanner, NeoReader QR & Barcode Scanner, Bar-Code Reader and QR Code Reader by Scan.

The Freehold Township Heritage Society has been working on a QR code tour for quite some time, and we are finally there! We will be posting signs with QR codes at various places on our four sites. As you visit our sites you can use the QR codes to get information and stories on the buildings and artifacts you are visiting. The signs and codes will be posted within the next few weeks.



HISTORIC SITES OF FREEHOLD TOWNSHIP

On behalf of the Freehold Township Historic Preservation Commission we would like to thank the Society for their help raising funds for preservation of our sites.

We are in final approval stage by the Federal Government for National Register Status on West Freehold Schoolhouse. We submitted the paperwork in 2019 but due to COVID it was postponed. We hope to hear something very soon—we are confident we will receive the status.

The Georgia Road Schoolhouse has new roofs on all buildings and the cupola was restored this year. This will be our next site to get on the National Register of Historic Places. The site is eligible, but we need to do much more research on the site. We have lots of historic information from late 1860 through the 1950s but are lacking pre-1860 research. We are reaching out to several research organizations to help with this. The site dates to 1735, when it was turned over by the Board of Governors of East Jersey to the Quakers for religious and educational purposes. We will need to apply for a Certified Local Government grant from New Jersey State Historic Preservation office to help offset the cost. It will be well worth it if we can achieve National Register Status as it will give us three sites listed on the Register.


The Commission is moving forward with Henderson Park as well. This site is located within the Freehold Marketplace and will be located on the Thomas Henderson home site. The barn is in the process of being rehabbed to serve as a visitor center, and the area where the house was situated will be cleared of brush and debris. A walking path will be established with seating and story boards explaining the significance of the site. Even though the house was burned in the 1980s the foundation is still visible in spots. We will expose the foundation of the original (circa 1734) house and show the footprint. The house was among many burned by the British during the Battle of Monmouth. Dr. Henderson was the town doctor and a Lieutenant in the Colonial Army. When he returned from the Battle of Monmouth he vowed to rebuild on the original foundation. This was accomplished and the house was named Cincinnati Hall. The Order of Cincinnati was the first veteran's organization established in the United States after the American Revolution.

We also had some news from one of the descendants of Henrick Williamson who is buried at Wikoff Hill Burial Ground. He was a patriot and fought in Battle of Monmouth. His family is filing application to get a historic marker for his grave. This also makes this site eligible for National Register Status as well.

We are so blessed to live in an area with such a wealth of history still visible.

Jigsaw puzzles were invented in 1767 as an enjoyable pastime. Playing these puzzles has a variety of benefits.

In child development, jigsaw puzzles help develop fine motor ability, eye-hand coordination, problemsolving skills, spatial awareness. and concentration.

In adults, benefits include improved memory, improved visual-spatial reasoning, increased attention to detail, lower stress levels, and improved mood.

In addition to the benefits mentioned above, in this time of quarantine, virtual jigsaw puzzles can help to pass the time.

There are three puzzles for you to solve. The links for them are found below. If clicking on the link doesn't work for you, type it or copy and paste the address in your browser.

A window will open with puzzle pieces. Pieces are moved with your mouse. You can change some things if you want as listed below:

- Play As drop down menu at the top right. Each picture included here is set for 20 or 24 pieces. You can change that if you want to in Play As. You can also change the shape of the pieces.
- Share drop down menu next to Play As. You can send the puzzle in an email or other ways.
- Maximize button in the bottom right corner will make the puzzle fill your screen.
- Several Buttons in the bottom left corner give you choices including Restart. You can also choose to put up a Ghost Image, which shows a faded copy of the picture you are working to solve.
- **Timer** is in the bottom center.
- Home, My Puzzles, Saved Games, Explore, and Create at the top left allow you options.
- Create is where you can create a jigsaw puzzle from your own photos.
- Once you solve a puzzle, a Restart circle appears in the bottom left corner if you want to do it again.

The National Wildlife Federation's program to create and certify a wildlife habitat is open to everyone. The Freehold Township Heritage Society is working on certifying our rain garden as such.

"Anyone can create a welcoming haven for local wildlife. Turning your yard, balcony container garden, schoolyard, work landscape, or roadside greenspace into a Certified Wildlife Habitat is fun, easy, and can make a lasting difference for wildlife."

It's very easy. You may already have all of the required elements in your garden. Wildlife need food, water, cover, and places to raise their young, and your certified garden will supply that. You can learn about a variety of things in the process, including the value of native plants.

The cost to certify your garden is only \$20.
